Matthew's Gospel Week 4: The King's wisdom

So far, we've seen how Christians believe that Jesus is the King God promised. We've also learned about what kind of King Jesus was—one with the power to save and to forgive sins.

Last week, we also learned about God's kingdom by looking at the parables Jesus told. Jesus taught that God's kingdom is worth more than we can imagine, but, as we saw in the final passage last week, not everyone is willing to accept Jesus as their king.

This week, we're going to learn more about God's kingdom by looking at Jesus' wise teachings about what it looks like to follow him as King.

Day 1's passage shows Jesus describing two ways to respond to his teaching. Spend some time considering the two responses, and think about which one appeals to you most, and why.

TICK WHEN COMPLETED.

Day 2's passage shows us something very surprising. The king of the kingdom is usually the wealthiest man in the land. Yet in the passage today we see King Jesus saying something you'd never imagine an earthly king to say: don't store up treasures on earth. Jesus isn't saying we should sell everything we have and live in a cardboard box! He's talking about our attitude to the things we have.

In this passage Jesus also talks about our eyes. Again, he's not talking about your eyesight, if you have 20:20 vision or if you wear glasses! He's talking about your focus, where you place your attention.

TICK WHEN COMPLETED.

In **Day 3's** passage, the kinds of oaths Jesus is talking about are when people use something powerful to back up their claim that something is true. Have you ever heard someone say 'I swear it's true' or 'Cross my heart and hope to die'? These are kinds of oaths.

Jesus gives a few reasons why we don't need to talk to one another like this. The wise King wants people to think about how they speak to one another.

TICK WHEN COMPLETED.

In **Day 4's** passage, Jesus challenges his listeners to think about their hearts. The people in Jesus' day were persecuted—they were Jews, living under the rule of the Romans. They had to obey Roman laws and pay taxes to the Roman government. Any Jews who protested this were arrested, jailed and sometimes killed. It is in this context that Jesus teaches about how to treat one's enemy. His teaching may surprise you!

TICK WHEN COMPLETED.

In **Day 5's** passage Jesus says something that is really hard to hear: 'Be perfect as your heavenly father is perfect'. What does this mean? If following Jesus' teachings 100% of the time was the only way to be in God's kingdom, no-one would have any hope. But Christians believe there is great hope. The second passage shows us that Jesus lived a perfect life and didn't sin (which is rebelling against and disobeying God). And God promises that those who trust in Jesus can be made right with God and forgiven—we're going to learn more about this in coming weeks.

TICK WHEN COMPLETED.





MATTHEW 7:24–29 (NirV)

‘So then, everyone who hears my words and puts them into practice is like a wise man. He builds his house on the rock. ²⁵ The rain comes down. The water rises. The winds blow and beat against that house. But it does not fall. It is built on the rock.

²⁶ But everyone who hears my words and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man. He builds his house on sand. ²⁷ The rain comes down. The water rises. The winds blow and beat against that house. And it falls with a loud crash.’

²⁸ Jesus finished saying all these things. The crowds were amazed at his teaching. ²⁹ That’s because he taught like one who had authority. He did not speak like their teachers of the law.

MATTHEW 6:19–24 (NirV)

‘Do not gather for yourselves riches on earth. Moths and rats can destroy them. Thieves can break in and steal them. ²⁰ Instead, gather for yourselves riches in heaven. There, moths and rats do not destroy them. There, thieves do not break in and steal them. ²¹ Your heart will be where your riches are.

²² ‘The eye is like a lamp for the body. Suppose your eyes are healthy. Then your whole body will be full of light. ²³ But suppose your eyes can’t see well. Then your whole body will be full of darkness. If the light inside you is darkness, then it is very dark! ²⁴ No-one can serve two masters at the same time. You will hate one of them and love the other. Or you will be faithful to one and dislike the other. You can’t serve God and money at the same time.’

MATTHEW 5:33–37 (NirV)

‘Again, you have heard what was said to your people long ago. They were told, “Do not break the promises you make to the Lord. Keep your promises to the Lord that you have made”.³⁴ But here is what I tell you. Do not make any promises like that at all. Do not make them in the name of heaven. That is God’s throne.³⁵ Do not make them in the name of the earth. That is the stool for God’s feet. Do not make them in the name of Jerusalem. That is the city of the Great King.³⁶ And do not make a promise in your own name. You can’t make even one hair of your head white or black.³⁷ All you need to say is simply “Yes” or “No”. Anything more than this comes from the evil one.’

⁴⁴ But here is what I tell you. Love your enemies. Pray for those who hurt you. ⁴⁵ Then you will be children of your Father who is in heaven. He causes his sun to shine on evil people and good people. He sends rain on those who do right and those who don't. ⁴⁶ If you love those who love you, what reward will you get? Even the tax collectors do that. ⁴⁷ If you greet only your own people, what more are you doing than others? Even people who are ungodly do that.’
